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
Back to School Tips

1) Designate a space for your child(ren) to do virtual learning. This could be at a table, at a desk, etc. Create a learning space or a few learning spaces. Sometimes kids do better at learning reading on the floor or couch but when it comes to math, sitting at a table is better.



- 2) Remember kids may still have homework. They may still need your help, but make sure they are also talking to their teacher about their needs, when they are stuck, or need more help.
- 3) Have your kids wake up and go to sleep at the time they normally would if school were in-person. Virtual learning is going to be a lot more demanding than it was in the spring. When your child(ren) go back to school face to face, their bodies need to be ready for the "normal" schedule.
- 4) Give your kids breaks to rest their eyes and keep good posture when looking at screens. Brain breaks are important. Things such as stretching, guided dances, and Gonoodle.com seem to be a fun outlets for kids.
- 5) Make it fun! Pack a lunch. Encourage them to get dressed and shower. Have "recess". Go on a "field trip." Remember to have your kids get outside. Have designated times where your child(ren) can video chat with their school friends. Remember, school is academically important but also socially. Make sure they are able to keep in contact with their school friends.
- 6) When you know in-person school is going to start, have your child practice wearing a face mask for a few hours during the day to help them get used to wearing it for an extended period of time.
- 7) And finally give teachers, your kids, and yourself grace. All teachers teach differently, kids learn differently, and parents parent differently. This is a different scenario, and everyone is on a learning curve. Help others where you can and when you can.

with hand motions. It is called "Here is the church". Face your hands toward each other, palms out. Lock your fingers together facing down with the thumbs out. "Here is the church." Mary's mom explained to the Sunday School teacher that Mary had been born with only a left hand. The teacher then prepared the lessons and activities so as not to bring attention to Mary's difference.

Everything was going well in class. Mary was joining in with the lessons and the activities. She was getting to meet all the students in the Sunday School class, and Mary website, or our other means of communication for more was having a wonderful time. The teacher went to close the class by doing something that they did all the time. They would say and participate in the little rhyme "Here is the church." The teacher began and she got all the way through when she said "Look inside at all the people." She turned white as a ghost, she stopped herself in midsentence. Her face had an expression of dismay. That is when Tommy, realizing the situation, turned to Mary and said "Let's do this rhyme together!" Tommy took his right hand and interlocked it with Mary's left hand. They both repeated the rhyme with the actions. Everyone rejoiced in the end.

I remember a rhyme I learned in Sunday School, complete We are the church. We are moving to reopen Zion's church building for worship. The church never closed. 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2020 - Zion's 240th Anniversary Year

What Was Happening The Year Zion Was Formed? 240 Years Ago - September 1780

September 21, 1780 - American General Benedict Arnold meets with British Major John Andre to discuss handing over West Point to the British, in return for the promise of a large sum of money and a high position in the British army. On September 21 of that year, Arnold met with Major John Andre and made his traitorous pact. However, the conspiracy was uncovered and Andre was captured and executed. Arnold, the former American patriot, fled to the enemy side and went on to lead British troops in Virginia and Connecticut. He later moved to England, though he never received all of what he'd been promised by the British. He died in London on June 14, 1801.

September News of the 1800s

Trustees of Zion Chapel—September 4, 1876—On motion Dr. Kurtz was authorized to embody the views of the Trustees in regard to the desecration of the church by tobacco chewers.

The Cambridge Era—September 28, 1878—The music committee of the M. E. Church have recently purchased a \$750. Estey organ.

Democrat & News—**September 27, 1884**—THE OLD CHURCHYARD - I am having the old church yard cleaned up, fenced and repaired. Those having friends and relatives buried there and especially interested, and feel disposed to contribute toward the expense, will confer a favor by leaving any amount they may please with Thomas H. Medford at the post office, or with the undersigned, will be duly acknowledged and applied. J.E. Bryan, Pastor ME Church

The Item—September 1894—Finding it impossible to run the public ferry over Cambridge harbor at the price allowed him by the county commissioners, Mr. J. A. Jordan had to throw up the contract. He is running the ferry, however, as an individual enterprise. The fare is only one cent for passengers, each way, and 5 cents for teams. Day passes are issued for 5 cents, allowing the holder to cross and recross as often as he wishes.

Democrat & News—**September 19, 1896**—Mr. J. B. Baker has put a telephone in his oyster house at the foot of Choptank Ave. and those who desire some of his excellent oysters for family use can give their orders without being compelled to go down there. Mr. Baker delivers all oysters ordered. His number is 61.

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UPDATE: Re-Opening for Worship




Bible Study: "The Reason for God."

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Dorchester Goes Purple 2020-Awareness Starts at Home

Dorchester County is joining all the Counties on the Eastern Shore this September by going purple to raise awareness of the ever-increasing opioid epidemic.

Talbot County led the way as the first county on the shore to go purple. The project was spearheaded by Lucie Hughes, then the President of the Tidewater Rotary Club and Talbot County Sheriff Joe Gamble. The project got broad engagement throughout Talbot County. The effort is based on a program created by the Herren Project and is best describe by this excerpt from their website:

"THP Project Purple is an initiative of The Herren Project, a non-profit foundation established by former NBA basketball player, Chris Herren that assists individuals and families struggling with addiction. The THP Project Purple initiative was launched to break the stigma of addiction, bring awareness to the dangers of substance abuse and encourage positive decision making to navigate life's challenges."

Each group that takes on the effort of Going Purple defines their goals and programs a little differently but ultimately the primary objective is to increase awareness. The goal of the program in Dorchester is quite simple but also very challenging at the same time. We want to increase awareness across all facets of our County's population, from elementary school aged students to retirees that are set to enjoy their golden years. This is important as this problem knows no age, race, geographical, social, education level or financial status boundary. Everyone is at risk for being affected by this epidemic, either by struggling directly with an addiction, being the loved one of someone struggling or being the employer of someone struggling.

Our tag line is "Awareness Starts at Home". Home can take on a lot of different meanings in this context. It can be the literal meaning of the structure within which one lives (house, apartment, etc). It can be a more general reference to the town/community in which you were born, or you have resided for a long time. It can be a headquarters or home base for operations. It can be an institution that cares for people. It can be a place of business. It can be a place of worship. For purposes of this project home is all of these things.

We want to turn all the "Homes" defined above purple acknowledging their awareness. This is a joint effort being led by the Dorchester Chamber of Commerce and the Dorchester County Sheriff James Phillips with the help of many organizations that have been engaged in the fight against this problem for a long time. Under the leadership of our Chairman, Mike Starling of WHCP Radio, we will be providing education options for all facets of the community in varying formats from in person presentations to printed literature to on line content. Once you have reviewed the material and increased your awareness the ask is for you to turn your "home" purple: it can be purple lights, purple signs, purple plants, purple food, purple clothes, purple stickers on your vehicles. Don't forget your purple masks/face coverings.

We want to see the entire County in **PURPLE** by the end of September.

Feeling connected to family, school, **church** and community protects young people from risky behaviors.

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- Between January and June of this year, Dorchester County had 56 opioid overdoses, of which 12 were fatal.
- We had a total of 10 opioid deaths in 2019, meaning we have surpassed last year's deaths in only half of the amount of time.
- Half of the 2020 Dorchester County overdoses, including fatal and non-fatal, are among individuals in their 30s.
- Approximately 70% of the overdoses are among individuals in their 20s to 30s.
