

## Local Service Organizations

Last month, Tom Wilson told us about Habitat for Humanity. This month, Gene Williams, president of the Cambridge Lions Club, tells us about this service organization.

Lions club International is a non-political service organization established in 1917 in Chicago, Illinois. It has over 46,000 local clubs and more than 1.4 million members in over two hundred countries. Lions are a group of service-minded men and women who are interested in improving their communities and are best known for their efforts in eradicating preventable blindness.

The Cambridge Lions Club was chartered in 1952, and today has 23 members. Some of our church members are active Lions: Kenny Thomas, Gene Williams, Pastor Dave Kelley, Debbie Yost, and Carolyn Williams. Cambridge Lions support many Lions International projects such as Lions Vision Research, the Wilmer Eye Institute at Johns Hopkins Hospital, Leader Dog for the Blind, and Lions Clubs International Foundation, where the donated funds go to support disaster relief. This may be the only foundation with no administrative costs.

Locally, our vision program supports local residents in need of eyeglasses and exams, as well as participating in the recycle for sight program where we collect used eyeglasses to be refurbished for use around the world. The Boy Scouts, Cambridge Little League, Delmarva Community Services, Dorchester County Schools, Meals Til Monday, Scholarships, Pleasant Day, Salvation Army, Dorchester General Hospital Foundation, and Cambridge Fire and Rescue are among the other community services that we support. The Lions have committed funds to the Cambridge Police Department to support the youth PAL program. We have also helped build two handicap ramps for local residents and have supported residents with wheelchairs.

All funds that we raise through our Golf Tournament, Lions Auction, and other fundraising events go back into our community.

Two of our Zion members, Kenny Thomas and Gene Williams, have been honored to receive a Melvin Jones Fellow award, the highest award a member can receive from Lions International.

## Stamps for the Wounded

Please remember to clip the postmarked postage stamps from your incoming mail and put them in the collection box located in the first floor lobby next to the coffee and cookie table. Gloria Brake is kind enough to see that these stamps are delivered to the appropriate destination.

Stamps For The Wounded was founded by Lions Clubs International in 1942 in New York, in response to an appeal from local Armed Services Hospital. It was extended nationwide in 1944 with the aid of the country's leading stamp societies. The organization is completely run by volunteers. The collected stamps are distributed to veterans hospitals and convalescent centers nationwide for use in various crafts and stamp collecting related hobbies.

Stamps can give bedridden and convalescent patients a consuming interest. Even the mentally disabled patient takes pleasure in using the common stamps to make greeting cards, or to cover decorative boxes in organized therapy sessions.

Stamps For The Wounded accepts any U.S. or foreign stamps that are not torn or damaged, as well as stamp collecting supplies and tools. They do request that each stamp has at least a quarter-inch margin around the edge. Do not try to either peel or steam the stamp off the original envelope. Thanks for your support!





For others, our mothers are still living, but we may be far apart from them by location and/or by our walk with God. Some of you are now mothers and you know the joy of seeing your children grow by God's love and grace. ## A Brief Biography of Our Centenarian, Dot Geoghegan

On April 2, 1921, Dorothy Marie Tracy was born to Albion (Bert) and Alice Tracy in Newark, NJ. At the age of 3, they moved to Union, NJ where she lived her formative years. She graduated from Union high School in 1938, having completed the 5th and 6th grades in one year. After she graduated, her first job was as the school secretary at Franklin School, the junior high school she attended.



She joined the US Coast Guard in 1943, and after basic training at the Palm Beach Training Station in Florida was stationed at the Brooklyn Coast Guard Supply Depot in Brooklyn, NY.

She married Claude Geoghegan in 1945, and their daughter, Barbara, was born in 1947. They owned and operated the Variety Corner Store at the corner of Choptank Ave. and Travers Street in the 1950s.

Dot worked at the State of Maryland Treasurer's Office in Annapolis for two years. In October, 1961, she traded the ride across the Bay for a ride across town and went to work for Western Publishing Company on Woods Road. She held many positions there, but was best know as the Senior Accounting Clerk and as a director of the Western Welfare Association. She retired from Western Publishing in 1986 after 25 years of faithful service..



Dot has been an active member at Zion, teaching a women's Sunday School class, serving as a circle leader, and active in other women's activities. She was also active at the Dorchester American Legion Post 91 and the Auxiliary serving in many Auxiliary offices including as the Auxiliary's president as well as the 2<sup>nd</sup> Auxiliary Vice President for the State of Maryland.

We celebrate with Dot her long and productive life of over 100 years.
